

WELCOME

Since fall 2014, the Teacher-to-Teacher Conference (T2T) has hosted over 550 education professionals from 29 different districts across the Southeast region of the United States. Although the primary focus is to provide affordable professional development sessions for teachers across North Carolina and South Carolina, the conference has attracted teachers from Georgia, Alabama, Virginia, and Florida.

The main goals of T2T are: 1) to provide professional development opportunities for teachers to learn from one another; and 2) to strengthen the network of support and leadership for professional educators amongst their colleagues. Participants in the conference have consisted of teachers (private, public, and charter), teacher educators, district administrators, third party educational vendors, and University of North Carolina at Charlotte faculty. Each year, data are collected from participants about their overall experience, their willingness to participate in future conferences, and their willingness to refer other education professionals to the conference. When asked if they would recommend this conference to a colleague or district administrator, 95 percent of T2T attendees indicated "yes." Furthermore, attendees have indicated on their exit survey that there is a strong need for this type of professional development opportunity in the community. With a wide variety of diverse offerings led by thoughtful and engaging presenters, the Teacher-to-Teacher conference continues to succeed in meeting both our established goals.
